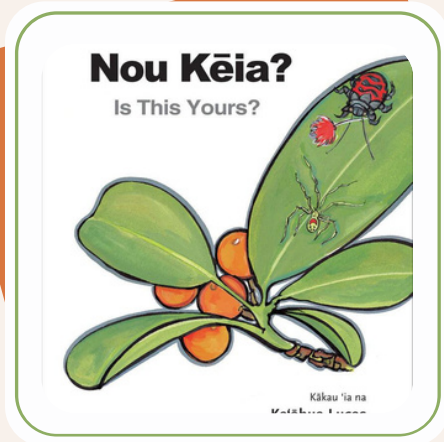

Let's Play!

Infant

Sing the rhyme “Itsy Bitsy Nananana” while doing the finger play song with your infant. Rhymes teach concepts like sequencing and body parts and help build early literacy and math skills.

Toddler

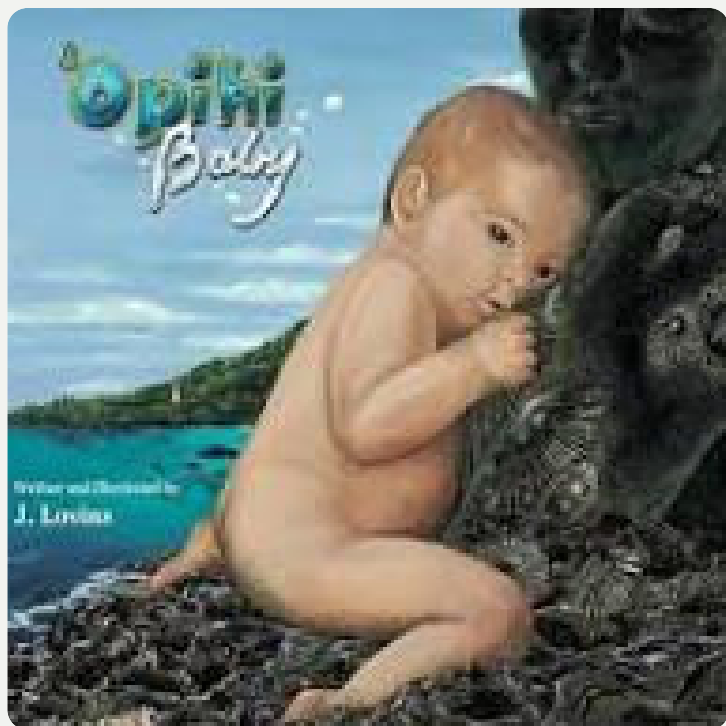
Using yellow paint and a sheet of paper, invite your toddler to finger paint a Nanana Makaki'i (Hawaiian Happy Face Spider). Explain that the Nanana Makaki'i has markings that resemble a happy face. Finger painting supports fine motor development and encourages sensory exploration.

Preschooler

Invite your preschooler to draw a Nanana Makaki'i. Count four legs on half the nananana, then add four more legs to the other half. Count the total number of legs to ensure all eight are there! Drawing is a fun way to introduce beginning addition.

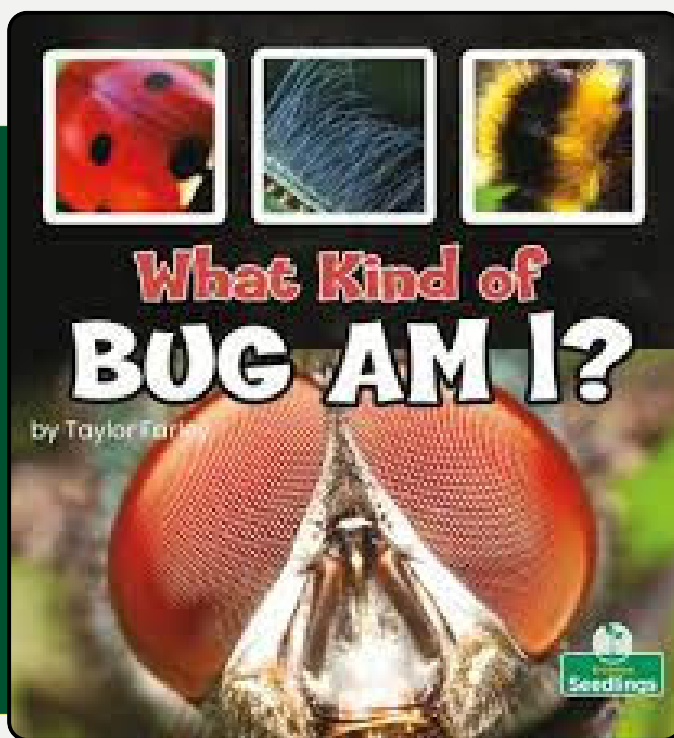
